# BUSES

School buses are for students to get to and from school.

A high standard of conduct is expected while travelling to and from school and opportunities often occur where college pupils are expected to show courtesy and consideration to others.

Students living more than 3.2 kilometres from the College are entitled to free bus transport.

Ineligible students who live within 3.2 kilometres may use the school bus service only if there is room.

A member of staff is in charge of the organisation of school buses but any major decision is the responsibility of the Ministry of Education and the local Transport Network which in turn may delegate authority to the College Principal.

# **BUS RULES**

Drivers from Go Bus and Leabourns appreciate common courtesy. Greeting them with "Good morning" or "Thanks" is a nice way to start or end the day.

- No one is allowed to arrive by bus and then leave the grounds to go to Farmhouse Bakery & Cafe/Kwik Mart/McDonalds or any other store.
- Students should always walk to their bus and get on and off the buses in a safe, orderly fashion.
- Students who leave school grounds after school are no longer considered bus students on that day and will NOT be allowed on the bus.

The following can incur a warning and then a suspension from the buses for the second offence:

- Students walking about while the bus is in motion
- Anything placed/thrown out of a window
- Food or drink consumed on the bus
- Foul language on the bus
- Bullying in any form verbal, physical, emotional. Serious offences may result in immediate suspension

The following can incur immediate suspension from the bus, by Go Bus (OSH reasons):

- Foul language/abuse to the driver
- Vaping or smoking
- Aerosol use
- Lighter use (matches, ignition devices)
- Moving across the road in front of a bus
- Damage/graffiti to the bus. Students will be charged for any damages they incur and can be refused travel by the bus companies until payment is made.

Students are instructed to remain for at least 20 seconds after the bus has departed before they cross a road in safety.

Students should be in the correct school uniform to travel by bus, except under special circumstances, such as a school trip or mufti day. During exam leave, senior students must wear the correct school uniform to catch a ride.

New bus students must bring the signed return slip back to school at the beginning of the school year, or as soon as possible after enrolment.

Students who incur a suspension may be required to sign a contract before they will be permitted to resume travel.

# **BYOD / DEVICES**

We have a 'Bring Your Own Device' programme that is used to further enhance learning.

- A laptop with an attached keyboard and operating system (the operating system can be either Windows, Mac or Chrome)
- Memory of 4 GB or more
- Hard drive with a minimum of 120GB SSD hard drive technology is preferred as much faster. Older laptops can significantly benefit from an SSD upgrade
- Have Google Chrome browser installed
- Sufficient battery life to last at least 6 hours on a single charge
- Be compact and portable for daily carrying

Note: Mobile devices such as phones are NOT regarded as suitable devices and are not permitted to be used during school time.

Students are urged to invest in some form of backup system to protect their work - e.g. the cloud or a portable hard drive.

### **CELLPHONE POLICY 'AWAY FOR THE DAY'**

#### YEAR 7 TO 13 PHONE RULES

All student phones must be switched off and kept in bags (not in pockets) for the **entire day**.

#### PHONE RULES FOR ALL STUDENTS

These rules apply to **all areas** of the school, including the Year 13 study room, library, auditorium, fitness suite, bathrooms and grounds.

As soon as you get off the bus, or arrive on site, your phone must be switched off and left in your bag. Phones cannot be used on the school grounds in the morning once you arrive.

# Phones cannot be used between classes, or at break times such as

**interval or lunchtime**. They must remain in your bag. No other devices (such as laptops, tablets or smart watches) may be used at break times.

Once you have been dismissed from class at the end of the day, you may turn your phone on and check messages.

The filming of fights is explicitly forbidden. Serious consequences will be issued to any student who films a fight.

#### CONSEQUENCES

Students caught using a cell phone will have it confiscated by the teacher. Students then need to meet with Mr Tennant after school to discuss the return of the cell phone.



# PHONE USE

All phones must be 'away for the day'.

We want students to focus on in-person relationships, avoid distractions of social media and reclaim the habits of attention in class.

# UNIFORM

The school uniform is a symbol of the school to which students belong and of which they can be proud. The school expects students to maintain a high standard of uniform and grooming from the moment they leave their homes until they return home after school. It follows that the school uniform should be worn complete and in a way that reflects credit on both the wearer and the school. Uniform standards are vigourously monitored and students have a responsibility to conform to those standards.

# **BEHAVIOUR**

Students at Mahurangi College must abide by two basic codes of behaviour - the School Code and the Classroom Code.

# **SCHOOL CODE**

- Be neatly dressed with the correct uniform and footwear
- Stay in the school grounds at interval and lunchtime unless you have permission to leave

- Show respect to others
- Do not hurt people physically or verbally, or use offensive language
- Do not possess or use gum, tobacco, vape or vape products, alcohol or harmful drugs or substances at school, or on school trips, or when identified as a member of Mahurangi College
- Take responsibility for the environment by placing all litter in the bins provided
- Obey all of the Classroom Code


### Downloading the Skool Loop app - a step by step guide

Once you have downloaded the Skool Loop App, via either your Google Play or App store, please follow the below instructions to select your school -

- Open the Skool Loop App you will land on a welcome page.
- Click the 'Select your schools' this will bring you to a menu you can either search your school
  or follow the country/region prompts.
- · Once you reach your school, select it with the tick on the righthand side.
- · Tap the 'select schools' button in the top right corner.
- · Tap the big orange choose button. This will load your school and bring you to the settings page.
- Subscribe to the groups that are relevant to you, then click the 'go back' button on your phone, which will bring you to the main screen of your schools app.

Students at Mahurangi College have many opportunities to express themselves in the arts through photography, design, painting and digital media. There are various competitions and exhibitions throughout the year for students to showcase their creative abilities.

#### **Iunior Concert Band**

Our Concert Band is for younger/less experienced students and also caters for local primary aged students who have been learning a band instrument and are at an appropriate level. Primary students are invited to join when put forward by their music teacher. We have one rehearsal per week before school and have performance opportunities throughout the year.

#### **Jazz Band**

Our Jazz Combo Band is for our most advanced students at Mahu. Students are auditioned and the membership of the band is the smallest and most structured of all our bands. Our Combo attends festivals and local venues.

#### Saxophone Ensemble

Our Sax Ensemble is open to advanced saxophone players. Tuition for the group is provided through the itinerant saxophone tutor.

#### **Rock Bands**

There are opportunities for juniors and seniors to create rock bands at Mahu. Juniors (Year 7 & 8s) will work towards performing at the Bandquest event and seniors (Y9-13) can write and perform their original songs at the Smokefree Rockquest event: as a band or in the solo/duo category or at Tangata Beats.

#### **Orchestra**

Orchestra provides an opportunity for our string, woodwind, brass and percussion musicians to participate in an ensemble. There will be various opportunities for the orchestra to perform at community and school events throughout the year.

A fun band with an Irish feel! This group has violins, cellos, flutes, recorders, drums, percussion, tin whistles, acoustic guitars, bass guitars, and keyboardists.

Te Whānau o Mahurangi Kapa Haka group is a group of students who embrace things Maori and learn how to perform as a group.

Our group learn Haka, Poi, Rākau Mahi, Hymns, Songs/ Waiata, Taiaha and Patu mahi. We learn to karanga and the powhiri process for when the occasion arises.



Our group is whanau based with everyone supporting each other. We visit the retirement villages as well as kindies. During ANZAC Day and Vets Day, we perform at the Warkworth RSA. We attend three festivals and perform at two; The Te Taitokerau and Kaipara.

We learn to be whanau and community-based and are encouraged to be proud of who they are. There are no restrictions to ethnicity. Students from Iceland, Spain, Germany and France have regularly been part of the group. You need to be willing to be in front of an audience, sing loud and proud and be willing to share.

#### PACIFIC

Our Pacific group is all about celebrating Pacific culture, values, dance, and performance and fostering leadership. Our Pacific cultural group learn traditional songs, dances and percussion routines that they perform at various celebrations throughout the year. To be involved in our group you have to be keen to perform in front of an audience. Our senior Pacific team will send out notices for you to come and ioin the fun.

# WELL-BEING @ MAHU

#### WHĀNAU SYSTEM

- Where appropriate, 'flipped learning' or in other words, the 'learner-centred' approach should be encouraged whereby students watch a pre-teach video, read appropriate text, complete research and so on.
- Homework set should be a pre-teach activity, revision, reinforcement or to finish off any incomplete classwork
- It is the expectation that homework set will be checked and commented on in a timely fashion


### LIBRARY

Our large library caters for up to three classes of students at the same time. This space offers flexibility to students as a quiet place to study, a breakout room for group projects, a place to dive into a good book, or somewhere to quietly relax at morning tea and lunchtimes.

Students can log into a well-organised system that will help them with their research and reading for enjoyment.







# **MOTOR VEHICLES**

- Students parking on Campbell Drive must adhere to the parking regulations.
- Students may not leave school grounds to move vehicles in limited time zones.
- Students may NOT park on school grounds. Carparks on school grounds are reserved for staff and visitors ONLY.
- Students must drive at all times, within the law. Any reports to the school where this has not happened will be reported directly to the Police. Where the student has been identified as a student at the college, the college will also take disciplinary action deemed appropriate.

# **MUSIC LESSONS**

Music@mahu offers lessons in piano, guitar, bass guitar, drums, cello, flute and voice taught by private teachers who bill you directly. A \$25 admin fee needs to be paid directly to the office as soon as your student is placed with a teacher and you may be required to purchase a tutor book.



The pricing for the private lessons varies between teachers. Some instrument teachers will take students in groups or pairs reducing the cost to you. Through the itinerant music scheme, we offer lessons on violin, brass, clarinet and saxophone, which are free except for the \$25 administration fee which is paid to the college office.

Students will need their own instrument for practising and where possible for lessons. Piano and drum students use the school instruments for lessons. Students will need to purchase tutor books where required. Students can store their instruments in the storage room in music@mahu during the day of their lesson.

Instruments can be hired through KBB Music, ABI or Music Works.

Learning an instrument through school is very user-friendly. Students come out of class for  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour once a week, missing  $\frac{1}{2}$  a different lesson each week. Students are responsible for catching up on classwork that is missed.

Places in instrument lessons are limited. First come, first served. Sign-up forms can be downloaded from our website.

#### PROCESS

- 1. Download and return the signed instrument form to Mrs Logue.
- 2. The form will be processed and sent to the appropriate teacher.
- 3. The teacher will contact you and answer questions, at this point you decide whether to go ahead or not.
- 4. You pay the admin fee to Student Services once you have a lesson time confirmed.

# OUT OF BOUNDS

All students are to remain in areas where they can be seen by staff. No student is allowed out of the school grounds without permission. The following areas are out of bounds:

#### MAIN UNIFORM

- **Boys** wear a school shirt and a pair of unisex school shorts/regulation school trousers.
- Girls wear a school shirt & a school skirt or a pair of shorts/regulation school trousers.
- Year 13 wear a white school shirt with the same school shorts/trausers school skirt
- Physical Education Students in Year 7-10 are • expected to wear the school P.E. gear.

#### SHOES AND SOCKS

- Students must wear a plain black shoe or sandal below the ankle.
- The shoes must be **completely** black (shoe. sole and laces) and have no coloured logos.
- The shoes must be clean, tidy and worn ٠ correctly.
- No high heels, must be a walking shoe.
- No boots, high tops, plastic or rubber shoes.
- Sandals must have a backstrap.
- Socks & stockings must be black with no logos. . Plain black ankle socks, not long socks, to be
- worn with shoes (but not with sandals).

#### HAIR

- Hair must be clean, neat, tidy and off the face at all times.
- Natural hair colours only. This includes no two-tone dving.
- Students must be clean shaven.
- For health & safety reasons in classes, such as • PE, technologies and science, you must wear hair longer than shoulder length tied back.
- If attending a formal occasion and wearing a • blazer, hair must be tied back.

#### JEWELLERY

#### Only the pieces below may be worn:

- · Up to two plain small studs or standard sleepers may be worn in each ear (only 2 per ear).
- Nose piercings: One small, plain nose stud no nose rings or other facial piercings.
- Ankle adornments are not permitted.
- Students may wear visible taonga around their necks and ta moko in a way that aligns with the cultural values of that taonga. On occasion.

staff may require taonga to be temporarily concealed or removed for health & safety reasons Cultural items of significance from other cultures may be worn, but not visibly.

#### **KEEPING SUN SAFE**

The school cap may be worn outside, peak facing forward. They are available for sale at Student Services for \$20. No other caps or hats are permitted. Caps must not be worn in classes. (At full day school events, students can wear any sun hat.)

#### **KEEPING WARM**

- A school jacket or jumper is part of the uniform and both are designed to keep you warm.
- A plain black or white short sleeve tee-shirt may be worn all year under the school shirt, but must be tucked in and not hanging out below. In terms 2 and 3 a plain black or white long sleeved teeshirt/thermal may be worn under the school shirt for warmth. (Year 13 undershirts must be white) A plain black scarf may be worn in the winter
- terms. (Y13's may wear white scarves) The school beanie may be worn in Terms 2 and 3
- only. Outside only. They are available for sale at Student Services for \$15.
- To and from school on cold and wet days students may wear a plain black or navy raincoat (these items are not to be worn during the school day).

#### NON-REGULATION ITEMS

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- No make-up is to be worn. No false nails or coloured nail polish, which includes toenails.
- No Mahurangi College team/group hoodies are to be worn during the school day.
- . Teachers will confiscate non-regulation items.
